The Princeton Clarion commenting on the tramp evil says editorially:

"Notwithstanding the tremendous crops and abundance of work to be had this summer Indiana has not been free from the tramp evil. The wandering "hobo" has visited the farm house and the village residence with the same regularity as of old, to put up his plea or his threat, according to circumstances, and to beg for the cold handout In considering this same nuisance in New England the Massachusetts Civic League advocates public lodging houses for wayfarers in every village.

"It is not necessary to advocate any such thing in Indiana In both field and workshop there is work crying for men to look after it at fair wages. The man that is strong enough to tramp the country is strong enough to work, and, if he will not work, he is not only not entitled to sympathy but he is a constant menace to the safety of the family on the farm and in the small village. The proper place for him is the pearest stonepile, and thither he should be sent forthwith in order that he may be trained in the useful habil of work.

"In a time of general depression, when farms are barren and workshops are closed, there may be some excuse for the tramp evil, but under present conditions there is absolutely none. There is plenty of work for every man that is willing to work, and there should be no room in the world at large for the idle beggar
