



Everything is Now in Readiness Except the Decorating of the Grounds-The Parade.

New Labor Day is fast approaching and every thing is about ready. save building platforms, erecting wires and decorating, and the committee will finish this up by Saturday evening. The Electrical Workers Union has consented to do all the wiring and place all lights that are needed on the grounds. The City Electric Lighting Co., have generously donated such material and arc lights that are necessary to properly light up the grounds.

The midway, south of the grandstand and east of the art hall, will be widened fifteen feet in order to give a larger space as a thoroughfare thus enabling a better passage for the people.

Privileges are fast being taken and the wider space on the midway will benefit the stand people greatly. All money for privileges, the committee states, must be paid in by 12 o'clock noon on New Labor Day, or else the stand people will not be allowed to remain on the grounds.

Another favor is asked, and that is, that no water, slop, banana peels, or any refuse whatever, be thrown upon the midway, as it tends to breed disease and is otherwise nasty. The committee desires that the prominade be kept, as clean as pos-

All business men are requested to .50decorate; whether on the line of march or not, as well as the residence people throughout the city. A nice showing will be greatly appreciated by the laboring men as well as the public in general.

> The official program is about completed and will be in the hands of the printer in a few days and ready for distribution by Saturday evening. Every post of the parade should be looked after carefully, every local seeing that they are in their proper place at the specified time. The I'ne of march is not complete, but it now depends entirely upon certain elements whether it will come off as previously arranged.
