FAMILY REUNION

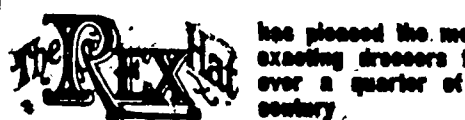
To be Held by Members of Family of Wm. A. Berry, Sr. Deceased, Next Month

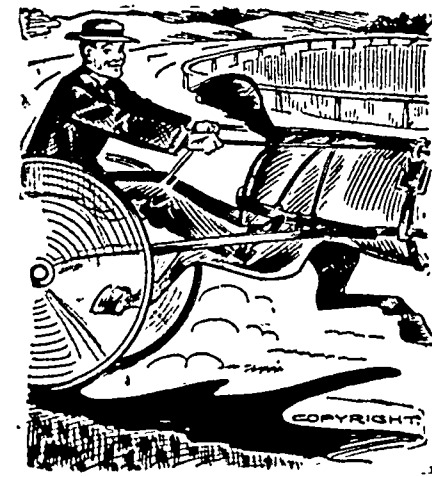
