LABOR DAY PARADE AT 10

Arrangements Made for One of the Largest Celebrations Ever Attempted Here

EVENTS AT GARVIN'S PARK

Three Noted Speakers, Band Concert and Numerous Contests and Games

Parade Will Form on Division Street, March to to Water, to Main, to the Park

One of the biggest Labor Day processions which has ever passed through Evansville streets will form this morning on Second, Third and Fourth streets, with heads on Division street.

The first division, on Fourth street, will move to the river and the other divisions will fall into line as the column passes Third and Second streets. The marchers will go up Water street to Main street and out to Garvin's park. Each division will have a band. The parade is scheduled to start at 10 o'clock.

First Division
