Thousands of Strangers from
Out of Town Expected to
Attend Local Celebrations

The "McNamara Protest" parade will be the feature of the Labor day celebration in Evansville today.

Besides the celebration planned on a broad scale by union labor organizations there will be plenty doing over the city for the public in general to spend the holiday. All stores will be closed during the day.

There will be motorcycle races at the fair grounds in the afternoon, fireworks at Cook's park at night, baseball at league park in the afternoon and other brands of amusement worth while. Thousands from out of town are expected to attend.

Organized labor leaders in the city expect one of the biggest outpourings in history at Garvin park this afternoon. An elaborate program has been planned, including speeches by well known labor orators, athletic events, and other things out of the ordinary. Among the unusual stunts will be a public wedding. The names of the happy couple will be withheld until they march to the altar before the crowd. Needless to say they will be given an ovation.

Several thousand union men are expected to participate in the parade which forms at 9 o'clock this morning. Five bands will furnish music. Thirty-five local organizations will be represented.

Among the orators who will address the crowds at the park this afternoon will be Hon. C. F. Smith of Logansport, Ind., national organizer of the A. F. of L., W. D. Van Horn of Terre Haute, president of District 11, United Mine Workers of America and William Raney, national board member of the United Mine Workers of America.

The Butchers' Union and the Women's Label league will hold a barbecue and German lunch.

There will be \$200 given in prizes to the winners of the athletic events. A good vaudeville program has been arranged. The formation of the parade follows:
