

HOSTS OF LABOR IN PARADE TODAY

Thousands of Members of Local
Unions Will March to Strains
of Martial Music

TO START, RAIN OR SHINE

Program at Garvin's Park In-
cludes Speeches and Band
Concert

Preparations Made to Handle
Large Crowds—Double Street
Car Track Completed

Unless the threatening clouds deluge

the city incessantly this morning, the hosts of organized labor will parade the downtown streets and later go to Garvin park where a program of speaking, music and athletic exercises will be carried out. The weather for today according to Observer Brand, will be of the "rain likely" variety. In fact the observer would be surprised if the city did not see showers. Unless the precipitation is very heavy, however, the parade will move at the stated hour, 10 o'clock. In case of rain between 9 and 10 o'clock, the parade may be somewhat delayed. It will take more than mere showers to break up the plans for the day.

The completion of the double track street railway to Garvin's park insures the best service the park has ever had. The street car company is prepared to handle 50,000 people out Main street today. With anything like decent weather, the crowd ought to break all records. The concession and other booths are all ready for the Labor day celebrators.

The speakers today at the park include the Rev. J. M. Gaiser and Vice President Shea of the International Union of Garment Makers. The successful culmination of the great strike by garment makers in New York makes the appearance of this speaker peculiarly timely. At the park a band concert by musicians under the direction of August Pfafflin will be given.

The parade will form on Second avenue and Division street, move from there to Water street, thence to Main and out Main to the park. The men will be four abreast. A number of the unions have secured special costumes for the event.

Business houses, banks, city and county buildings will close for the day. The marriage license office at the court house will be open, however, because Cupid is the one fellow who can today work overtime and still not lose standing in the union.
