

LITTLE LABOR ON LABOR DAY HERE

**C. L. U. Will Go to Henderson but
Carpenters Will Have Picnic
of Their Own**

Labor day, tomorrow, will be observed in Evansville, with the suspension of practically all business. The banks will remain closed all day, as will many of the big stores and most of the others will close their doors at noon. The manufacturing plants all shut down Saturday until Tuesday morning, the Globe-Bosse-World employes also enjoying a vacation last Saturday because of the pro-Labor day celebration of the Bosse Furniture Mutual Benefit association.

The unions affiliated with the Central Labor union will join the C. L. U. of Henderson in the celebration to be held at Henderson. They have chartered the steamer Prince and barge Princess for their pilgrimage, leaving this city at 8:30 in the morning and at 1 o'clock in the afternoon, with return trips at 10:30 a. m. and 6 p. m.

The West Side band will accompany the local unions and head their division in the big industrial parade which will take place at Henderson at 10 o'clock. They will also be joined by a big delegation from Vincennes due to arrive in this city on a special train early in the morning. The parade will be headed by the Henderson police and fire departments and, besides the Henderson and local divisions, there will be one composed of unions from Owensboro and other Kentucky points.

A baseball game will be played at the fair grounds at 10:30 in the morning and at noon a barbecue dinner will be served. The program for the afternoon will be as follows: 1:30 o'clock, welcome address by Mayor J. W. Johnson and addresses on "Unionism" by Mother Jones, international organizer for the United Mine Workers of America, by W. E. Tieman of Evansville on "War and the Labor Movement" and other prominent labor leaders; 3 o'clock, horse and mule races; 4 o'clock, baseball throwing contest; 4:30 o'clock, motorcycle races, this to be followed with other numbers.

Celebrations at Evansville
Carpenters' union No. 90 will celebrate the day with a picnic at West Heights Cave park. The Labor day committee, composed of Messrs. W. C. Shrode, J. Owens, A. C. Rose, W. A. Wilson, L. W. Lamb and J. L. Tate, have prepared an interesting program for the entertainment of the members and their friends, the affair being open to the public. This will consist of a voting contest for the most popular man; lemon eating contest; fat men's race; ladies' voting contest; ladies' guessing contest; running race; boys' race and others. Barbecue meats and other refreshments will be provided.

At Cook's electric park there will be celebrations both day and night. Lessee Weber declares the program after supper will mark the biggest night in the history of the park. There will be an elaborate display of fireworks, including spectacular set pieces and concluding with a grand bombardment. A superior concert with a big chorus in the open air will also feature.

Private picnics galore have been arranged for the day in the city parks and in neighboring groves. Numerous launch trips are booked. For the baseball devotees a double header between Evansville and Richmond will be the attraction at Bosse field.
