The final preparations for the celebration of Labor Day were completed by the Central Labor union yesterday. The completed plans indicate that the celebration this year will be the biggest in history.

The day will be formally opened this morning with a monster labor parade which will move promptly at 9:30 o'clock. The line of march follows:

BIG CROWD TO HEAR KERN ON LABOR DAY

PRINCETON, Sept. 2.—Princeton will be the mecca for hundreds of visitors next Monday when the Labor Day celebration will be held here.

There will be a big parade in the morning and in the afternoon at Lafayette park Senator John W. Kern will speak. There will also be other speakers.

An amusement program has been arranged for following the speaking with a balloon ascension late in the afternoon. The special train from Huntingburg is expected to bring a big delegation from that city and other points.

SAYS BULGARIAN RELATIONS WITH GREECE ARE GOOD

BERLIN, Sept. 2.—(By wireless to Sayville)—Dr. Rizow, the Bulgarian minister to Germany, in an interview in the Berliner Tageblatt, is quoted by the Overseas News agency as saying:

"The entire Bulgarian nation knows perfectly well that Rumania hates us and that she cannot support the idea of a great and strong Bulgaria, allied to victorious Germany and strengthened Austria-Hungary after the war. Everyone knows that Russian triumph would lead to the end of Bulgarian independence as the way to Constantinople through Bulgaria.

"For these political and moral reasons, Bulgaria could not take any other decision. If we waited until Rumania took the first step it will now be understood why.

"Our relations with Greece are good. The Greek government has been correct in its attitude towards us and we would not do anything likely to give the antagonists of the Greek government argument for referring to the treaty between Rumania and Greece as to the guarantees of the Bucharest treaty. We do not wish to furnish this arm to Venizelos and his party."
