# JONES AND TIEMAN TO SPEAK AT HENDERSON

# ST. LOUIS YOUTH HONORED BY FRANCE

Mother Jones and "Daddy" Tieman, head of the Evansville C. L. U., are to be the principal speakers at the Henderson fair grounds Monday where the labor unions of Evansville, Henderson, Vincennes and several southern Kentucky cities will celebrate the national holiday.

PARIS, Aug. 20.—Allen, son of Richard Blount of St. Louis, who joined the foreign legion in April, has written to his father that he has been proposed for the war cross with palm for taking thirty prisoners single handed in the fighting at Verdun. He was wounded slightly in the hand.

The Vincennes delegation will come to Evansville on special cars and will join the local men for a boat trip to Henderson. The boat will leave at 8 o'clock. A second trip will be made at 11 o'clock.

Mr. Blount has considerably exceeded the expectations of his father who said at the time of his boy's enlistment: "I want my son to account for five Germans."

At 10 o'clock a big parade of all the assembled union men, led by two brass bands will start in Henderson. The parade will be followed by a baseball game and in the afternoon, Mother Jones and other speakers will address the men on the coal situation.

### Feel Need for Pullmans and Coaches to Facilitate Movement of Troops
