

LABOR DAY SALE TO BE UNHALTED

Pastors Enter Protest Against Liquor Sale by Unions Monday.

FILE NO AFFIDAVITS, THEY PROMISE TIEMAN.

Committee Told Workingmen Stand Responsible for Inci- dents Growing Out of Liquor Sale, Will Take No Further Steps.

As a result of a meeting Wednesday morning between members of the local Ministerial Association and President William Tieman of the Central Labor Union, the sale of liquor at the Labor Day celebration will take place without active opposition from the ministerial body.

The ministers informed the labor union head that they would file no affidavits against those selling liquor next Monday, nor would they be a party to such prosecution. Mr. Tieman, on the other hand, agreed that the unions would hold themselves responsible for any incidents growing out of such sales.

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In answer to this, Tieman reviewed the fact that Labor Day had no significance for others than the laboring class; that it was a day set aside for them to enjoy themselves; and that when this day was designated for them, there was no restriction of any kind placed upon them.

Mr. Tieman stated that arrangements had been made for an orderly observance of the laws on that day and that the grounds would be patrolled to see that the law was enforced and order maintained.

According to Mr. Tieman, the ministers insisted that their hearts were with the laboring men and they wished for a successful celebration. "But," added the ministers, "we are conscious-bound to disagree with you on this one question of the sale of liquor on the grounds."

File No Affidavits.

Mr. Tieman stated that the ministers assured him, after they learned that all efforts to prevent the sale of liquor had proved futile, that they would file no affidavits against parties selling liquor, nor would they be a party to such a prosecution.

Rev. Mr. Brightmire, chairman of the pastors' committee, following the conference stated that, despite the fact that labor leaders here were of the opinion that they were not violating the law by selling liquor on the grounds, according to the instructions the ministers had received from the governor and the attorney general, it was a direct violation of the state law.

"We were instructed," said the minister, "to take the matter up with the prosecuting attorney, and have a sufficient number of deputy constables sworn in office to close up every stand and make arrests of parties selling intoxicating liquor."

"I assured Mr. Tieman," said Rev. Mr. Brightmire, "that such action was not likely to be taken, as we bore no malice against the union leaders. They have assumed responsibility for what occurs because of the sale of liquor, and the matter will rest there."

"The fact that we will not swear to affidavits for violation of this particular section of the law," continued the minister, "does not mean that we have agreed not to be a party to affidavits for other offenses."
