Beyond this, state department of-
ficials declined to elaborate on Hull's
public notice of Washington's views.
But observers stressed one factor as
minimizing the likelihood of more
trouble between the two governments
in the immediate future.

The Third International, whose
August congress in Moscow provoked
a protest against "flagrant viola-
tions" against Soviet non-interfer-
ence pledges, had not met in seven
years. It was considered doubtful
whether the world-wide communist
organization would assemble again
for another two or three years.

Hull's statement was not sent to
the Soviet government in the form
of a note and consequently calls for
no reply. It was assumed, however,
Alexander Troyanovsky, the Soviet
ambassador, will forward copies to
Moscow. The envoy was at his sum-
mer place near Annapolis, Md.

**MUSSOLINI THREATENS DEATH
OF LEAGUE IF IT**

Says League Is So Weak It Will
Collapse Of Its Own Weight If
Italy Withdraws Her Sup-
port

London, Sept. 3.—The league of
nations will sign its own death war-
rants if any decision is taken against
Italy in favor of Ethiopia at the
special league council crisis meeting
Wednesday, Premier Mussolini
caustically warned.

In an interview with the London
Sunday Chronicle, Il Duce cited with
Japanese and German withdrawals
from Geneva as weakening the
league to such an extent that should
Italy cancel her league membership
the Geneva body would collapse of
its own weight.
