A meter station will be installed just west of the college athletic field, where the pipe line enters the city. A business office will be maintained in this city.

The council approved the \$5,000.00 bond of the Indiana Oil & Gas Corporation. The company holds a franchise to furnish natural gas to Oakland City homes and business firms.

J. H. Cockrum was appointed as inspector of mains. It will be his duty to see that the gas company puts the mains in in the proper manner and covers them up properly.

The assessment roll for the E. H. Baker system of streets was presented by Claude Noble of Princeton, who was appointed by County Engineer Harry Morrison to take care of the work. The assessment roll was approved by the council and the legal notice appears in this issue of the Journal. The curb and gutter on north Madison, Vine and north Main streets has been completed.

Routine business was attended to and the council adjourned until Monday, Sept. 9.
