# Grand, Petit Jurors Busy September Court

A crowd estimated by police at six to eight thousand, converged on Petersburg Monday for the Annual Labor Day Parade and to attend festivities of the final day of the 3-day celebration.

Most observers said it was the largest number of persons ever seen in Petersburg. Officials told The Press the crowd was exceeded by two to three times the number expected.

The parade was one of the finest ever presented in Petersburg and went off without incident. Both young and old were delighted with the high-stepping bands, drum majors and majorettes, the beautiful floats by unions and businesses, and the large number of union members who paraded in working uniforms.

One spectator said of the horses in the parade, "I never saw so many horses in my life."

Lasting approximately one hour, the parade traveled a route of almost two miles, ending after passing the judges' stand at Hornady Park.

Winning prizes for the best floats in the parade were: Union division - first, Lynnville Local No. 9926; second, Potter-Brumfield Local No. 1459; and 3rd, King's Mine Local No. 5584, Princeton.

Shell Oil Company of Boonville was awarded the only prize given for floats in the business division.

Prizes for the best Uniform Dress worn by local members in the parade went to: first, Glass Bottle Blowers Assn., Local No. 179 of Oakland City; second, Squal Creek Mine, Local No. 1189, Millersburg, and 3rd, Emge Local

No. 172 of Fort Branch.

The trophy for locals with the best percentage of members, 100 and over, went to Enos Mine Local No. 5179. Enos Mine No. 5, Local No. 4343, Winslow, was awarded the trophy for memberships of less than 100.

Immediately following the parade Mayor T. F. O'Rourke of Petersburg gave the welcome address at Hornady Park to begin activities for the final day of the celebration.

In the afternoon the large crowd heard several union speakers and was entertained with free acts and rides on the midway. In the evening the free acts program was again presented.

The winners of the talent show held Sunday evening were:

First prize winner of \$25.00 Teresa Steve and Angela Bodkins, vocal trio of Princeton; second prize of \$15.00 was Karla

Dunning, baton twirler, of Francisco; and third prize of \$10.00, event to vocalist, Phil Boyer of Dale. All other contestants entered received a cash prize of \$5.00.

Parking space in Petersburg prior to the parade was precious. The only incident to mar the day was a traffic jam, which developed when the large crowd moved to Hornady Park following the parade.

Mr. Orman Graper, a member of the union committee in charge of the celebration, told The Press the committee was well satisfied with the way the celebration went off and very well pleased with the cooperation of Petersburg officials and business men.

The Annual Labor Day Celebration is sponsored by locals of the U. M. W. of A., the A. F. L. and C. I. O.

Grand and petit jurors for the September term of the Pike Circuit court were drawn Monday by the jury commissioners.

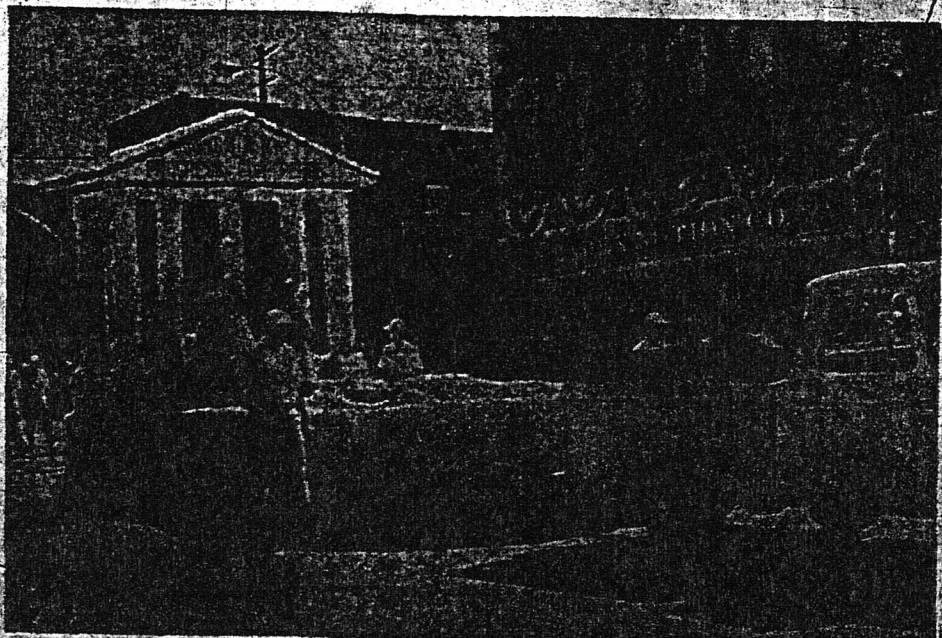
The September term of court opens Monday, September 13, with a very busy docket. During the term of court other juries will be drawn for special cases in addition to the petit and grand juries.
