PIKE BOND SALE DROP

Pike County's saving bonds sales for July were \$31,672.69 and \$42,186.84 for the like period of last year. Thirty-seven Indiana counties reported sales gains over a year ago, according to George Hornbrook, committee chairman.

School Enrollment Drops

Petersburg initial school enrollment dropped this year to a five year low, according to Superintendent Lorel Coleman, who said the financial aid received from the state could be cut by two teacher units unless enrollment increases sufficiently before October 1.

Coleman stressed that two

teachers would not be dropped, but that state reimbursement might be given on a basis of 31 teachers rather than 33.

Total enrollment at the end of school last year was 918 pupils as compared with an initial enrollment of 891 pupils, Monday. Initial enrollment in 1956 '57 was 941. In 1955, it was 942 as compared with 946 in 1954 and 951 in 1952.

This year's initial enrollment in the grade school totalled 446 with enrollment by grades as follows: first, 82; second, 74; third, 66; fourth, 75; fifth, 79; and sixth, 70.

Six year high school enrollment amounted to 318 as follows: grade 7, 64; grade 8, 63; grade 9, 88; grade 10, 88; and grade 11, 68; and grade 12, 74.

The annual three-day Labor Day celebration will be held at Petersburg beginning Saturday, to be climaxed Monday by the traditional Labor Day parade, starting at 10 a. m., and a program of important speakers in the afternoon. Somewhere between fifteen and twenty thousand persons are expected to attend this year's celebration and Petersburg's Hornady Park and the new park entrance are ready as promised last year by local business and civic leaders.

Winslow Couple Injured Seriously In Accident

Township Budget Is Approved Without Cut

A group of taxpayers appeared Tuesday night before a meeting of the Washington Township advisory board to suggest reductions in the 1958 budget. It was determined that much of the township budget is determined by costs of transferring pupils to the Petersburg school. No reductions were made in the budget, the Advisory Board voting to accept it as submitted.

Hearing on the Petersburg school budget was to be held Thursday night at the school building. Two day hearing on the county budget is scheduled by statute for Tuesday and Wednesday, September 3 and 4.

Taxpayers association affiliates intended to attend both hearings where suggestions for reductions in rates will be made.

Driver of the other vehicle was William Ritter, LaPorte, Calif., who was not injured. Sheriff Wilmer Whitehead determined that the accident was the result of obstructed vision and neither driver was cited.

Prize for the horse show in each class will be first prize, \$15; second \$12; third, \$8; and fifth, \$4. The show will be conducted under western horsemanship rules. Doyle Gunn, Clinton, Ind., will be the judge. Committee in charge are Henry Blythe, Mertis Underhill, and Richard Pugh.

On the midway Saturday night will be the Burkhardt Show with rides, shows and concessions.

The Sunday evening program, an amateur show with twelve big acts, will start at 8 p. m. Committee in charge are Robert Tuley, Frank Henegar, and Oscar Gibbs.

Ohio Valley Ranch Hands will present a brief musical program at 1:30 p. m. followed at 2 p. m. by an address by Congressman Winfield K. Denton, Evansville. More entertainment will follow, then at 3:15, the main speaker, Michael Widman, of Washington, D. C., international representative of U.M.W., will make the main speech of the day.

Barnes-Carruthers Shows will be on the midway and will present an array of free acts at intervals during the afternoon program, the final series of free acts beginning at 8 p. m. Other entertainment will be furnished by the Ohio Valley Ranch Hands.

Parade Plans Announced

Police Chief C. A. Harvey stated Thursday that final plans for the Monday morning parade call for blocking off Main street from First to Twelfth streets.
