

Isaac C. Higgins Loses Life While at the Fair Grounds.

A shudder of horror followed the announcement that Isaac Higgins, one of Petersburg's best known citizens, had met with a horrible death at the fair grounds.

Among the events of the day's celebration, and probably the one drawing more people to the grounds than any other, was the automobile race, which by the way, was given by the Petersburg Racing Association.

His neck and several ribs were broken, as were both legs below the knees, chest and in between the head and serious injuries to the body in many other places.

The preliminary examinations by squire George Tucker and the inquest by coroner Kinman, held jointly Tuesday and Wednesday, were continued until next Monday afternoon at 1 o'clock, when decisions will be rendered.

The members of the family state that they have no ill feelings against Mr. Pickett, as in no way was he to be blamed for the awful tragedy and that he should not be held responsible.

Mr. Higgins was born in Logan township seventy seven years ago, and from where he enlisted as a soldier of the civil war.

His family consists of his wife, three sons, James, Isaac, Will, and two daughters, Mrs. Ethel Howell, all of this city, and Mrs. Margaret Smith of Manson, Colorado.

A wish, frequently expressed by the deceased, was granted—stating that when the time came to die he would go quickly and without the suffering of an illness.

The funeral services will be held at 3 o'clock this, Friday afternoon, at the local Methodist church—the deceased being one of its oldest, most faithful and loyal members.
