

LABOR DAY OBSERVED

Biggest Crowd of People in Green Bay in Many Years

Monday was Labor Day and it brought together one of the largest crowds of people ever assembled on the fair ground, being estimated at from 8,000 to 10,000. The people began to come early in the morning and by ten o'clock the streets were crowded and automobiles were continually passing through town to the fair grounds, and it is estimated that there were nearly 2,000 autos on the grounds.

The parade started about eleven o'clock, passing down Main street to the fair grounds. The parade was headed by the Bruceville band and then followed the various labor organizations—miners, carpenters, clerks and teamsters. Several firms were represented with displays and floats in the parade, they being C. H. Carlisle, the Ford dealer, Walter's concrete factory, Minnhart Ice Co., Wilkinson Lumber Co., Elkins, the tinner, G. W. Sims and Son, music dealers, Carroll & Co. miners, and Fleming Bros., auto dealers. Then followed a long line of autos. The parade was very creditable and the largest of any of former years.

At the fair ground during the afternoon there was an address by William Mitch, of Terre Haute, boxing and wrestling matches, running races and other amusements, and wound up with an auto race with six starters. John Johnson, of Petersburg, was first in both heats, Tinsley, of Louisville, was second, Ball, of Brownstown, third, and Davidson of Petersburg, Stigdor of Huntington and Knowles of Vincennes, divided fourth money.
