Boonville Labor Day Celebration Underway

All roads lead to Boonville this week-end for the big celebration of the Southern Indiana Labor Day association. No special observance is scheduled in Princeton.

The Boonville program, which got underway at the Boonville fair-grounds with a horse show Saturday afternoon and night, will continue today with a sacred service at 2:30 p. m., with Rev. Don McAnnally, of Princeton, the speaker. A free amateur show of 12 acts will be

staged at 8 p. m.

Milton Board of Princeton, vice president of the association, will be master of ceremonies for today's program.

A gigantic parade will start moving at 10 a. m. Monday from the Boonville courthouse to the fairgrounds. Finishing touches are being put on elaborate floats by the various union locals. All UM-WA locals in this area will be represented in the colorful line of march, along with business men's groups, Girl and Boy Scouts and mounted members of the various Saddle clubs.

The Dixieland band from Camp Atterbury will lead the parade and the Princeton high school band also will take part, preceding the float and members of the Kings mine local.

Speakers on the Monday afternoon program will be Charles Ferguson, member of the international UMWA executive board in charge of safety;; George Doupe, of the Indiana Farm Bureau, and Rep. D. Bailey Merrill of Evansville, eighth district congressman.

The Thomas Joyland rides will be on the midway and the Barnes-Caruthers shows will present a program of headline acts on the stage in front of the grandstand.

The Princeton Nazarene church will present Bill Mills of Texas who will present a program designed for the Prevention of Crime and Parental and Juvenile Delinquency, Wednesday night in the

church auditorium beginning at 7:30 o'clock.

Mr. Mills will tell of his marvelous conversion while behind prison bars and will wear the prison uniform to show how disgraceful it is to be a convict. He will also have the electric chair with him and will demonstrate "The Last Mile" walk of condemned prisoners and will tell how he saw 16 men electrocuted in the electric chair.
