BERNSTEEN WILL ASSIST STARK CO. GRAND JURY PROBE

BERNSTEEN CONSIDERS HIS HELP AS A CIVIC DUTY AND WILL HELP CONDUCT THE PROBE WITHOUT REMUNERATION, HE SAYS.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Aug. 20.—(By U.P.)—United States District Attorney A. E. Bernsteen, whose prosecution of bootleggers has become nation wide, before leaving on a week's vacation, will assist personally with the grand jury probe in the murder of Don R. Mellett. "I have been requested to take a hand in the Stark county grand jury investigating the Mellett murder case and crime conditions in Canton," Bernsteen told the United Press today. "If the citizens of Stark county wish, I will be glad to do so without remuneration, as I consider it a civic duty," Bernsteen said.
