**FINE PROGRAM FOR GREAT LABOR CELEBRATION HERE**

"SOMETHING DOING" FROM PARADE IN MORNING UNTIL LATE AT NIGHT, AT GIBSON COUNTY FAIRGROUNDS, MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 6

Extensive preparations for the great Labor Day celebration in Princeton on Monday, Sept. 6, are being carried out and all arrangements are being rapidly completed for the greatest labor celebration in this entire section of the country.

Not only all labor unions south of the B. & O. railway will be represented in the street parade and all day celebration at the Gibson county fairgrounds, but farmers organizations as well are completing their plans to take part in the big affair.

The Patoka township Farm Bureau organization held a meeting Thursday night in the office of County Agent C. M. East, when plans were made and committees appointed for participating in the Labor Day parade. This township will have a large delegation in line and committee heads have set to work making final plans.

Tonight in the bank building at Francisco, the Center township Farm Bureau will make plans for the Labor day parade and on next Monday night, Johnson township Farm Bureau will hold a similar meeting at Haubstadt. This, along with other plans, assure a great outpouring of farmers and their families for the labor celebration.

The morning parade at 10 o'clock through the streets of Princeton will move up Main street from the south. Judgments already are that the parade lineup will extend far out the Dixie Bee south of the city. In addition to being doubled on all intersecting streets south of the public square making without doubt the longest and best parade ever held here.

Following the parade to the fairgrounds, a band concert will be held at 12 o'clock noon at the amphitheater. At 1 p. m., W. H. Settle, president of the Indiana Farm Bureau, will deliver an address, a male quartette will render numbers and then at 2 p. m. Powers Hapgood noted man who has worked in mines of various countries, will deliver another address. Mr. Hapgood being one of the headliners for the program.

Free acts are to occupy the hour from 3 to 4, followed by a male quartette and Charleston dancing contest. At 4:30, a baseball game, with band concert, will be staged and at 6 p. m. a balloon ascension.

From 7 to 8 p. m., male quartet and free acts will furnish the entertainment, with grand display of fireworks beginning at 8 o'clock. The final feature of the program will be a boxing contest at conclusion of the fireworks display.

Such an arrangement insures, an elaborate program for entertainment of the tremendous crowd that is expected for the Labor Day celebration.

**HURRICANE TOLL GREATER THAN FIRST BELIEVED**

NO TRACE OF 13 FISHERMEN MISSING FROM GULF COAST COLONY—PROPERTY LOSS AT \$1,000,000.

New Orleans, La., Aug. 27.—(By U.P.)—A communication was re-established today with communities isolated until this morning by the hurricane which struck the gulf coast Wednesday night, a much heavier toll of lives and property than had been expected was indicated.

Thirteen fishermen are missing from Barataria fishing colony and searching parties have been unable to find any trace of the men or their boats.

Property damage was estimated today at \$1,000,000. Sixty percent of standing crops was reported destroyed in the gale-swept area which stretched inland almost 100 miles. Stockmen also suffered heavily when cattle were drowned or killed by falling trees.

**PURCHASE FENCE FOR NEW LOWELL ATHLETIC FIELD**

ORNAMENTAL DESIGN MESH EIGHT FEET HIGH TO BE ERECTED AS SOON AS CONSTRUCTION WORK IS COMPLETED

Assurance that the new Lowell athletic field will be enclosed before the opening hour event of the season. Princeton-Oakland City high school football game on Saturday, October 2, is made with the purchase by the city school board of a fence to enclose the field. Purchase has been made by the Anchor Iron & Post Co., of Cleveland, O.

The athletic field fence is of the ornamental type mesh, eight feet high, providing for vehicle gates on West street at the northeast corner of the field and on Hall street at the northwest corner, in addition to gate at the south door of Lowell school building. The fence will be shipped here Sept. 1 and will be installed as soon as the field is entirely completed, fence installation probably being by Sept. 20 at the latest.

Work on the athletic field continues to progress at a nice rate under supervision of Contractor J. H. Palmer of Danville Ill, although there is yet much work to be done there. Within the next few days, the big concrete sewer in Richland creek at the lower edge of the original Lowell school grounds, will be completed. This will be covered over and the entire ground must be graded and rolled. Stakes were set several days ago for the cinder running track which will be built inside the fence and at the outer edge of the football gridiron and the location of the football markers which will be set in concrete bases.
