FINE PROGRAM OF ENTERTAINMENT AT BOONVILLE MONDAY

GIGANTIC PARADE AT 10:15 A.M. TO BE FOLLOWED BY FAIR GROUNDS EVENTS LABOR DAY -SPECIAL SOUTHERN TRAIN.

An elaborate entertainment program for the thousands of persons expected to attend from throughout this entire section, has been arranged for the gigantic Labor Day celebration at Boonville Monday, Sept. 2.

Following the morning parade, the fair grounds program will continue until 10:00 p.m. Van A. Biltner, UMWA organizer, of West Virginia, and William H. Settle, president of the Indiana Farm Bureau Federation, are to deliver addresses. An extensive program of free acts will be given, afternoon and evening. Concerts will be played by the Princeton American Legion band, with the director, Prof. Irvin L. Oster, as soloist and by the Boonville band. A boxing show will be held at night, with Joe Lynn, popular Princeton pug, now of Detroit, Mich., carded in the headliner. Lynn is expected to arrive home, ready for the Boonville fight.

Free acts de luxe have been secured for the celebration. Heading this program are Catherine Sinclair & Company, two men and Miss Sinclair, who display extraordinary feats of skill. This act features hand-to-hand work and Miss Sinclair catching her partners on her shoulders. Bruno Weise & Company, three men, present a unique offering of marvellous equilibrium, music bits and acrobatic stunts, their gymnastic work in particular, being remarkable. Prince D'Hoshi, great Japanese equilibrist, performs great feats, featuring a sensational toe sike and other feats. Many other acts have been arranged on this program at the Boonville fair grounds.

The parade of union labor and farm bureau organizations is scheduled to start promptly at 10:15 a.m. with H. J. Fritz, this city, as grand marshal. Eight bands are to participate in the march, including the Princeton American Legion and Princeton high school bands. Stoppers, miners and many other locals from Gibson county, as well as farmers organizations, will be in line.

A special train operating over the Southern to Boonville via Huntingburg, will leave Princeton at 7:00 o'clock Monday morning, with several hundred expected to be aboard. The fare from this city is \$1.50 round trip. The time schedule enroute to Boonville from various stops follows:

PRINCETON CAR IS OVERTURNED ON HIGHWAY

MRS. JOHN FINNEY, MRS. RA CATO, MRS. CHARLES HENMAN INJURED THURSDAY -OTHER DRIVER NOT APPEARED

Mrs. John Finney, 917 south street, is confined to her home, suffering with painful injuries sustained between 1 and 2 o'clock Thursday noon when a light sedan in which was riding enroute to Evansville was struck by a heavier northbound and overturned on the slab of highway 41, between Evansville and Madison. Mrs. Finney sustained a broken rib and a chest injury. Her daughter, Mrs. Ralph Cato, 507 1/2 Race street, was bruised, while Mrs. Charles Heiserman, 913 Race street, was injured. Mrs. Floyd Finney was injured aside from a severe slip.

Mrs. Cato was driving the car, Mr. Cato riding in the front seat, the others in the rear seat. As the bound black car, driven by a man who passed a car ahead of the Princeton people, the man headed toward the sedan driven by Mrs. Cato. STEAMERS COLLIDE OFF SAN FRANCISCO FIFTY LIVES LOST

EXCURSION PASSENGER BOAT LOADED WITH MERRY-MAKERS CAUGHT IN FOG OFF COAST MAKING RESCUE DIFFICULT

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 30 —(UP)—Amid the screams of terror stricken passengers mingling with the hoarse roar of fog horns, the ancient steamer San Juan sank in the Pacific, 50 miles south of here early today, exacting a death toll estimated at more than 50 persons.

It was at 11:30 o'clock last night that the San Juan, en route from San Francisco to Los Angeles, collided with the S. C. T. Dodd, an oil tanker. Five minutes later the San Juan went to the bottom, spilling into the sea the 65 passengers and crew of 45.

Answering the frantic S-O-S calls sent by the San Juan before the water killed its power, the McCormick lumber carrier Munami rushed in search of the wreck.

The Dodd, which was not damaged seriously, stood by and with the Munami launched life boats. Twenty sev-
