INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., July 9.—(UP)—The paid congregation will make its debut at Cadle Tabernacle here Sunday.

E. Howard Cadle, evangelist, who constructed the huge edifice and is conducting a campaign to raise funds to pay off its indebtedness, has found it difficult to fill a sizeable portion of the 10,000 seats.

Today Cadle advertised that every person going to the tabernacle next Sunday would receive a card entitling him to a free wash for his auto, valued at 50c.

SOMERVILLE, Ind., July 10.—(Special)—A frame house occupied by Floyd Julian and family, about two miles east of Somerville, was destroyed by fire, which was discovered about daylight Thursday morning.

CENSUS SHOWS ONLY 10 BLACKSMITH SHOPS

CHICAGO, Ill., July 10.—(UP)—Horses have become such curiosities on the streets of Chicago that today only one of the city's 10 remaining blacksmith shops is doing sufficient business to retain as many as two full-time employees.

An investigation by the Chicago Association of Commerce discloses that in the 210 square miles making up the city there are only 10 horseshoeing establishments and that all of these combined boast a collective working force of 11 men.
