# Race Program At Gibson County Fair Next Week Includes Feature Even

Speed Superintendent D. J. Flowers of the Gibson county fair association arrived here yesterday after visiting more than twenty fairs in Indiana, Illinois and Kentucky. Superintendent Flowers is bringing to the Gibson county fair some horses that make the eyes of race lovers open wide.

"There have been as many horses here at former fairs," said Mr. Flowers, "as we will have here next week. But I can say now that never in the history of the fair have there been so many good horses."

Among the notable races next week will be one Thursday which appears on the program as the 2:12 pace. But Superintendent Flowers is making

a 2:10 pace. There is every indication that this will be one of the and fastest races ever seen on grounds. Derby day on Wednesday will be something new. It will be a real derby. The horses will race before the grand stand and judges stand; the horses will up at the 16th pole and will be ed from a barrier. It will be first barrier start ever soon on or any other county fair track in part of the country.

The distance is a mile and sixteenth, consequently the horses will race past the amphitheatre the judges' stand three times.
