EMIL SEIDEL IS LABOR SPEAKER HERE NEXT MONDAY

FORMER MILWAUKEE, WIS., MAYOR, WIDELY KNOWN FOR LABOR WORK—PARADE BECOMING LARGER—FINE PROGRAM COMPLETE.

Announcement was made Friday by Thomas Elsfelder, this city, chairman of the speakers committee, that Emil Seidel, former mayor of Milwaukee, Wis., and noted for his efforts in behalf of organized labor, has been secured as the labor speaker at the gigantic Labor Day celebration to be held Monday, Sept. 5, in Princeton.

Mr. Seidel will deliver his address at the Gibson county fair grounds, where an all day and evening program will be held following the morning parade. All should hear this most capable speaker and leader.

In addition to Mr. Seidel, another speaker of note, will be heard, with an address by W. H. Settle, president of the Indiana Farm Bureau, who will be the farmers speaker. Mr. Settle has been heard here previously and he will no doubt be given a splendid hearing.

With additional floats being built and displays arranged by various organizations and firms, there is every indication that nearly 100 floats and other splendid displays of various character will be in the great parade Monday morning at 10 o'clock. Labor unions, farmers and merchants are competing for cash prizes offered for the best parade displays. In addition, miners locals will compete for a loving cup offered among themselves each year. The miners will appear in up-to-the-minute outfits and with floats and some of the organizations hiring bands for the march.

The parade will move north on south Main street, instead of Prince street, as previously stated, with H. J. Fritz, grand marshal, in charge. All units will form on designated intersecting streets both east and west of Main, and on outer south Main street. Places of the seven big divisions in the line have been drawn, but exact location and streets on which the different units will form, will be made public Saturday.

After the line of march reaches the fair grounds and disbands upon circling the race track, where the judges will make the prize awards, an entertainment program will continue until late at night, with plenty of music and many forms of entertainment for the great crowd.

Hope for the seven missing Dole flyers in the Pacific has been abandoned completely.

The William Randolph Hearst plane "Old Goby," continued to await favorable weather at Roosevelt Field, New York for its proposed New York to Rome flight.
