ADVANCE PLANS FOR GREAT LABOR DAY CELEBRATION

At a meeting of the Southern Indiana Labor Day Association, Sunday afternoon in the Princeton C. L. U. hall, plans were advanced for the gigantic Labor Day celebration to be held in Princeton on Monday, Sept. 7. Parade formation was drawn and other details arranged, all of which will be announced within due time.

James Murdock, vice-president of the Railway Trainmen of Canada, will be one of the headline Labor Day speakers here. M. Cliff Townsend will speak for the farmers organizations.

On Sunday afternoon, Sept. 6, the day before Labor Day, a sacred concert and church service will be held at 3 o'clock at the amphitheater in the fair grounds. Dr. L. C. Jeffrey, of the First Methodist church, will be the speaker. Amplifiers will be installed for this service. As a special feature of the service, the Inman Round House, Atlanta, Ga., colored quartette will sing a special program of religious selections.

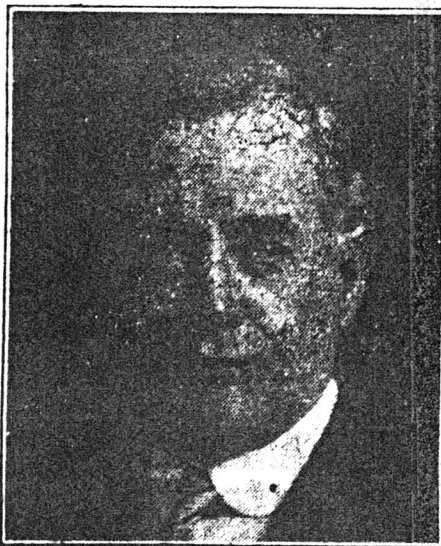
