# PLANS ADVANCED FOR GREAT LABOR DAY CELEBRATION

## JUDGES OF PARADE AND WINDOW DISPLAYS NAMED SUNDAY AND OTHER DETAILS HANDLED—SCHOOLS CLOSED.

Plans for the gigantic Union Labor Day celebration to be held in Princeton on Monday, Sept. 7, were reviewed and advanced at a meeting of the Southern Indiana Labor Day association, Sunday afternoon in the Princeton C. L. U. hall.

H. J. Fritz, grand marshal of the great parade, has his divisions all made out, as drawn at a recent meeting. The parade will be in six big divisions. It was decided Sunday that no plain cars or vehicles of any kind will be permitted in the parade. All vehicles must be decorated. The parade formation and line of march will be announced later.

The following men were appointed judges of the business firms floats in the parade competition for prizes, and of store window displays of union made goods: Warner Barrett, Oakland City; John Reynolds, Princeton; Frank Herbert, Eilberfeld, with F. Floemer, Louis Nugent and Charles Hurt named as alternates. The following are to judge the labor and farm bureau organizations parade displays: Harry V. Hyatt, Washington; Albert Derr, Boonville, and Charles Oxby, Spurgeon, with George Crimp, a Mr. Moyer, of Boonville, and Paul Daugherty, Princeton, as alternates.

An added feature of the celebration program at the fair grounds was announced as a tug of war between the Princeton and Washington Shopcrafts. Amplifiers will carry the speaking and musical programs over the grounds to the great crowds expected.

The association received and accepted a letter to Secretary Theodore Kays from County Supt. V. S. Abbott, as follows: "The township trustees have instructed me to say they expect to co-operate with you in the interest of Labor Day celebration by dismissing school."

Supt. G. E. Derbyshire of the Princeton schools, has announced that the schools will not open until the day after Labor Day. The Washington delegation also reported at Sunday's meeting that their schools will be closed Labor Day to permit all to attend the celebration here.

# BRITISH LABOR GOVERNMENT IS BROUGHT TO END

## ANNOUNCEMENT OF THE FORMATION OF THE NATIONAL GOVERNMENT FOLLOWS BETWEEN KING GEORGE AND RAMSEY MACDONALD AND OTHERS.

LONDON, Eng., Aug. 24—(UP)—Britain's labor government came to an end today.

It was announced officially that national government was being formed to ride out the present economic and financial crisis.

Battling heavy odds in attempts to make up a budget deficit of \$600,000,000, pacify elements which opposed a reduction in the unemployment benefit, and keep members of his own cabinet in line, Premier J. Ramsey MacDonald capitulated this morning.
