**GOVERNOR PAYS TRIBUTE TO WORKERS
 IN EDICT SETTING APART LABOR DAY**

The first Monday in September has been set aside by the statutes of Indiana as Labor day and the importance of the occasion has been emphasized by the making of this day a legal holiday.

The fact that Labor day is a legal holiday brings out the truth that in America there is no caste of laborers. The entire country is called on each year to celebrate the day and to pay tribute to the man who uses his skill and strength for the progress and prosperity of his country.

In this year of 1917 Labor day should have a special significance for labor is more vital and more precious in America today than it has been for a quarter of a century and never before has the importance of the American worker for the world's good been so great as it is now, when the great cause of democracy is depending for its resources on the brain and brawn of America.

Labor is the foundation and the strength of every civilized nation. This fact was never more apparent

than it is today.

Let us, therefore, set aside the first Monday in September to renew our faith in the nation and the workers great and small who are so vital to its welfare.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, James P. Goodrich, governor of the state of Indiana, do designate and proclaim **MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 3, 1917,** as **LABOR DAY,**

and on this day I direct that all offices—state, county and municipal—be closed, and I urge all the people of Indiana, insofar as it is practicable for them to do so, to observe this day as a public holiday in the honor of labor.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused to be affixed the great seal of the state of Indiana, at the capitol, in the city of Indianapolis, this 24th day of August, 1917.
