## WEEK-END FLASHES

LOS ANGELES, Calif., July 6.—(UP)—At least 20 persons were drowned by treacherous rip tides which endangered lives of hundreds of holiday bathers on beaches near Los Angeles. Life guards rescued about 300 others, including Marion Nixon, motion picture actress.

CHICAGO, Ill., July 6.—(UP)—An attempt to blow up an elevated railway terminal was discovered by police after one of the bombs had exploded but caused only slight damage. John Graff, apartment house owner, from whose building nine tenants recently moved because of noise from the trains, was arrested. Two unexploded bombs were found in the terminal.

CHICAGO, Ill., July 6.—(UP)—Several bathing beaches were closed after four bathers lost their lives over the week-end because of a powerful undertow in Lake Michigan. Seven other persons also were drowned in the Chicago area. High winds created waves on the lake and resulted in the undertow.
