## CROWDS THROG TO BOONVILLE TO HONOR LABOR

**GREAT CELEBRATION THERE TODAY, STARTING WITH PARADE—EXTENSIVE ENTERTAINMENT PROGRAM AT FAIRGROUNDS**

All roads led to Boonville today (Monday) for the Union Labor Day celebration. This city, in particular, was astir early, as hundreds had arranged to make the trip by either auto or train.

A special train over the Southern to Boonville via Huntingburg and making several stops enroute took several hundred men, women and children to the Warrick county capital. A total of about 1000 tickets were sold from here. The special was scheduled to arrive at Boonville at 9:30 a. m. and returning from that city will depart at 10 p. m. making the same stops on the home-bound trip.

The big feature starting the Labor Day celebration was the street parade of labor unions, Farm Bureau organizations, bands, floats, etc., at 10:15 a. m. At the Boonville fairgrounds, an extensive program was to be given all day and evening, consisting of addresses, band concerts, free acts, balloon ascension, boxing show at night and many other features.
