LABOR CELEBRATION HOLDS FORTH TODAY

UNION LABOR ORGANIZATIONS BEGIN PROGRAM WITH MAMMOTH STREET PARADE THIS MORNING, FOL-LOWED BY RACES AND BALL GAME THIS AFTER-NOON AND FIREWORKS DISPLAY TONIGHT-HUN-DREDS THRONG GROUNDS SUNDAY.

Organized labor held sway today on the occasion of Labor Day. While today was the date for the official opening of the Gibson county fair, a combined celebration by union labor organizations brought hundreds of persons to the city. Indications at an early hour today were that the relebration would probably be the greatest ever staged by labor unions here.

The program for today and the week officially opened with a street parade of labor organizations, this morning. Forming in south Race street, the line of march moved north to Broadway, west on Broadway and around the public square to the fairgrounds. Hundreds of marchers representing practically every union in towns, were in line,

The Siegrist and Silbon shows ar rived Saturday afternoon and the equipment was immediately taken to the fairgrounds. The shows are more nearly like a circus than any other. About forty wagons of the circus type are used. The shows travel in big snow style and have three sleepers for persons connected with the carnival. The vast number of attractions and concessions of Siegrist and Silbon, have been placed along the south side of the fairgrounds, a number of the attractions being along the north and south midway.

On entering the grounds from the main gute on the east, one finds the usual eat and drink stands and racks on the main midway. North of the midway and near the southeast curve a roller skating rink has been in operation over the week-end. Next to a track gate, which goes through into the center ring is the C. L. U. stand, conducted by the Central Labor union of this city. Soft drinks, sandwiches and confections of all kinds are being sold at the stand, the proceeds going toward paying the added expense of staging today's monster Labor Day celebration, including fireworks and other features. The C. L. U. stand did a flourishing business Sunday and will be operated throughout today,

The Fair Attractions.
