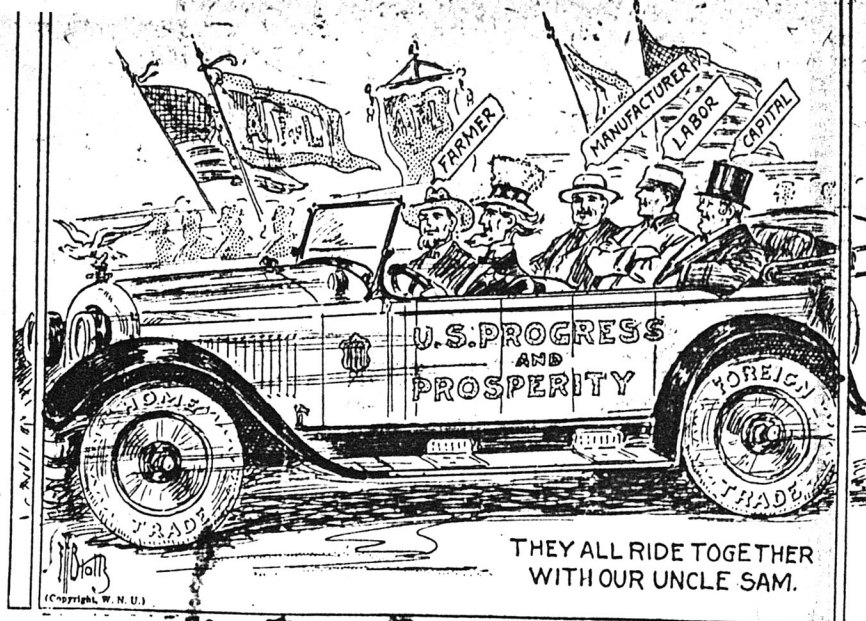

LABOR PARADE  
 FORMATION AND  
 LINE OF MARCH

Seven divisions have been mapped out for the Labor Day parade in Princeton, Monday morning. These divisions will be in line as follows:

- Petersburg Band.
- C. L. U. Float.
- Ment Cutters.
- Miners, including local No. 3457, Francisco mine No. 2; No. 5179, Enos; No. 2410, Gudgel; No. 3345, Somerville; No. 5584, Kings; No. 551, Magnolia; No. 4149, Buckskin; No. 352, Oakland City; such others as may come in will be placed in this section.
- Barbers.
- Farm Bureau.
- Printers.
- Building Trades, including carpenters of Princeton, Painters, Carpenters of Oakland City, Plasterers, Electrical Workers, etc.
- Shop crafts, including Sheet Metal Workers, Blacksmiths, Bollemakers, Machinists, Carmen, etc.

Parade at 10 A. M.

H. J. Fritz, of this city, parade marshal, and who handled the march last year, announces that the parade will move out from south Main street exactly at 10 a. m. regardless of whether all organizations or representations are in line. Everyone participating must be on the designated streets ready to move at that hour, and no later.

The parade will form on various streets in the south part of the city, and moving north in Main to Broadway, west on Broadway to Hart, north on Hart to State, east on State to Main, north on Main to Spruce, west on Spruce to the fair grounds.

The parade will enter the fair grounds at the northeast vehicle gate and the entire line will move completely around the race track. Judges will be located on the free acts platform in front of the amphitheater and the line will move past them to be judged for prizes before disbanding.

Various floats will be distributed by the parade marshal and his assistants, so as to be properly spaced through the long line. V. W. Compton, this city, one of the parade marshals, Saturday made public the formation of various units on intersecting streets east and west of Main as follows:

- Clark—east of Main—Butchers, Francisco miners, Boonville band, Enos miners.
- Clark—west of Main—Gudgel miners, Somerville miners.
- Monroe—east of Main—King Station miners, Magnolia miners, Buckskin miners.
- Monroe—west of Main—Gray miners, barbers.
- Pinekey—both east and west of Main—Farm Bureau organizations, printers.
- Mulberry—east of Main—Building trades, including carpenters of Princeton, painters, carpenters of Oakland City, plasterers, electrical workers, etc., Patoka band, blacksmiths, sheet metal workers.
- Mulberry—west of Main—machinists, carmen, bollemakers.
- Christian—east of Main—All business houses floats and displays.

insure a fair the rest and at the same time make improvements of a substantial character each year, yet this is the record of the Gibson County Fair.

It is generally known, of course, to all our people that the Fair Association is not a dividend-paying corporation. All the profits go toward the organization and are expended for improvements. The officers draw no salaries of consequence, theirs is a labor of love, regardless of what many people may say or think, this is a fact, and the stockholders of the association are distributed in all sections of Gibson County with not a few of them residing in other sections of the United States. The secretary, treasurer and superintendent receive each \$100 per year for their services and other officials receive only their expenses whenever they go on an advertising or boosting trip for the Gibson County Fair.

The directors and various superintendents of departments serve without pay and they only receive passes to the fair for themselves and families, while the same courtesy is extended to stockholders of the association, this being the only return for their money invested in the stock.

As a general "home-coming" for Gibson County people, the Great and Only is the one event of the year and former residents of Gibson County who plan vacations nearly always reserve the First Week in September for their visit as they know that the Gibson County Fair will afford them an opportunity of seeing a greater number of their old friends and acquaintances than any other event of the year. That is one of the reasons for the great success of the Fair. Another is the general knowledge that it is not a money making institution. The advance in prices for admission which have taken place in the past years was not for the purpose of raising more money but to pay the additional entertainment the people demanded.

Once a visitor at the Fair, one is likely to come again every year they are within reasonable distance. The accommodations are the best in this section of the country. The grounds for the most beautiful and the entertainment which is offered for the money has no comparison elsewhere. The pony races usually cost as much for a single admission as it requires to buy a ticket for the entire week at the Gibson County Fair. At one place you see only jumpers and have an opportunity to bet and lose all your money, at the Gibson County Fair you have a week's real enjoyment with plenty to see and no opportunity to lose your money in betting on horse races unless you "look up" the proper element, which, of course, is present at all such public gatherings, but at the Gibson County Fair they are not permitted to operate openly.

The free acts, racing, music, fireworks and general amusement of the week are not to be equalled anywhere; we feel safe in saying this without fear of successful contradiction at the price.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS

Notice is hereby given by the undersigned that the Board of Commissioners of Gibson county, Indiana, at the office of the County Auditor in Princeton, Indiana, will receive sealed proposals for the construction of an improved highway as set out in the plans and specifications, profiles and requisitions now on file in the office of the County Auditor.

Said sealed proposals will be opened and the contract awarded for said improvement on the 17th day of September, 1927.

Bids or proposals will be received up to 11 o'clock A. M. on said date.

The said improvement is located in Gibson county, Indiana, and more particularly known as John A. Kirk et al County Unit Road.

The estimated cost of said improvement is \$18,000.00.

Bids will be for the completion of the said improvement in accordance with the plans, profiles and specifications in the office of the County Auditor, and shall include all labor and material for said work. In no case will extra compensation be allowed for any additional work alleged to have been done by the contractor of contractors to whom is awarded the contract.

Each bid shall be accompanied by a personal or surety bond in a sum equal to double the amount of the bid filed for the work bid on, to be approved by Board of Commissioners. Said bond shall be conditioned for the faithful performance of the work; the sureties, if personal, shall be resident freeholders of the State of Indiana, one of whom shall be a resident of Gibson county.

Said bond shall be for the benefit of any person, persons or corporation who shall suffer any loss or damage by reason of any such bidder failing or neglecting to enter into a contract to perform such work awarded on the bid or to carry out the same in any particular or to pay for any labor or material which may have been furnished to any such contractor or contractors or to any sub-contractor, agent or superintendent under him, in the construction of said work.

Said contract will be let as a whole to the lowest responsible bidder upon affidavit of noncollusion, which must be submitted with the bid, and upon failure to submit such affidavit such proposal or bid will be rejected and the board reserves the right to reject any and all bids. Time for the completion of said work will be agreed upon after the letting of said contract by Board of Commissioners and successful bidder.
