HENDERSON BRITISH LABOR PARTY REPRESENT-ATIVE QUITS POST '

Activity In Interest of Socialist Peace Conference At Stockholm Brought Him Into Disfavor-Denies Acting In Official Capacity

(Bulletin). WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 11.-Secretary of State Lansing today announced that no passports will be issued to Americans desiring to attend the Stockholm socialist conference. The state department looks with disfavor on the conference for fear it will spread peace germs.

LONDON, Aug. 11.-Arthur Henderson without portfolio and former member of the war cabinet has resigned it was officially announced today, Henderson is the labor memter of the minitary who has been active in advocating participation of British labor in the Stockholm socialist conference.

Henderson's resignation was mediately accepted. Henderson has been under fire since he went to Paris recently to confer with French socialists as to participation n the international socialist conference scheduled in Stockholm next month He defended his action by stating he had met with the French socialist es the leader of the labor par y in England not as a cabinet minister or official of the British government. ella presence however was regarded as giving the impression that British officialdom was taking part in the discretison and brought a great up-

H. nderson's position as a member of the war council, t'e inner council of the cabinet, made hi active connection with the Stockholm conference especially objectionable

9,000 ARE OUT IN ILLINOIS AS A RESULT OF EXCESSIVE COAL PROFITS

Men Demand \$1.00 a Day Extra -Governors of Central States Meet To Discuss "Outrageous Coal Price" Situation

CHICAGO, Ill., Aug. 11. -Twenty one Illinois coal mines was closed down yesterday as a result of a strike of 9,000 miners, according to announcements by representatives of the Illinois coal operators. The mines effected have a combined output of \$1,000,000 tons a day. officials said the men were striking for one dollar a day increase because of the unfounded publicity given enormous profits alleged to be taken by operators.

Several hundred of the minera are already out, according to the official and others are expected to go out at once. The mines said to be effected are on the Northwestern, the Chicago and Alton and the Missouri Pacific. The reported strike was followed by announcement that the governors of Michigan, Wisconsin, Indiana and Illinois would meet in Chicago either today or tomorrow to discuss the reduction in coal prices.

The operators say a voluntary slash in prices is contemplated.

RUBBER SMUGGLING GANG IS ARRESTED IN NEW YORK BY FEDERAL AGENTS

NEW YORK, Aug. 11. - Nine men were arrested yesterday in the first swoop o fthe police against what is believed to be a gigantic plot for smuggling rubber and platinum Germany.

Six of those seized are sailors of the Red Star steamer Gothland, a Belgian relief ship. Three others are alleged American agents of the conspiracy. Arrest of "higher-ups" are expected.

When searched the sailors were discovered to have coils of rubber wrapped around their bodies. Authorities believe the traffic aggregated \$50,00 to \$100,000 a week.
