As an attraction that will make a strong appeal to the children, the management of the Southern Indiana Labor Day association has engaged Miss Lulu's Animal Circus, consisting of thirteen dogs, a highly trained pony, an ape, and a bucking mule for the Labor Day celebration at Princeton, Monday, Sept. 7.

Miss Lulu's large collection of trained dogs make a pretty picture as they sit on pedestals, awaiting their turns, their hairy coats shining like satin. Miss Lulu always keeps the animals looking slick, spic and span for every performance, and adds to the cheerfulness of her act with plenty of good looking stage props, flashy harness and bright trappings.

The dogs seem to know their parts so well that they need little or no

coaching on the part of their trainer. Whips, prodding and shouting are no part of Miss Lulu's method of training. The nod of the head, the wave of a hand, and the animals know what comes next on the program.

As a comedy feature, "Hambone," the toughest of unrideable Missouri mules, keeps the crowds in an uproar of merriment. No one has been able to put a saddle on "Hambone," so the would-be riders attempt to stick on his bare back. Their efforts to ride the wiggling, kicking, twisting bucker tickle the older people in the audience and get the kids panicky with laughter.
