SERIOUSLY HURT

OAKLAND CITY, Ind., AUG. 29.—An automobile driven by Lytle Houchin, accompanied by his daughter, was struck by a westbound Southern train at a grade crossing a short distance from here Friday afternoon. Houchin was seriously injured and was removed to the Methodist hospital at Princeton. The girl escaped with slight injuries. The automobile is a wreck.

At the hospital this afternoon, it was stated that Houchin was resting fairly well. He sustained several cuts and bruises. It was stated, but the complete extent of his injuries could not yet be determined.

MONSTER LABOR DAY CELEBRATION HAS BEEN ARRANGED FOR, WITH BIG PARADE IN MORNING AS STARTER FOR THE DAY

The arrangements have all been made for a great day next Monday. The only thing that can keep us from having a big time is the rain and Marshall Blake says he has that matter all fixed. Practically every business house and office will be closed. The first thing is the big parade in the morning, commencing at 9:30 A. M. For fear some of you have forgotten the line of march we will mention it again today.

The parade will start at Kentucky and Gibson streets, thence north to State street, thence to Main street, thence to Broadway, hence to Hart street, thence to Spruce street, and from Spruce street to the fairgrounds.

W. of A; on Kentucky street facing Gibson, the central Labor Union, the machinists, the Oaktown band, the speakers of the day, mayor of the city, judge of the circuit court and the reception committee.

There will positively be good horse racing, some good free attractions, good music, good speaking and a general good time. We expect to have a big time Monday. bolo; three hand grenades, assorted; one rifle grenade thrower; one shell for Stokes mortar; one German helmet; one gas mask; one shell-section, alized, for 3 inch gun; one shrapnel, for 3 inch gun; one thirty-seven millimeter gun with carriage; one Moss equipment.
