## PRINCETON COAL COMPANY MAKES PUBLIC STATEMENT

**ANNOUNCES KINGS MINE WILL BE READY FOR OPERATION. TUESDAY, SEPT. 2—COMMENTS ON DOUBLE SHIFT OPERATION.**

The Princeton Coal Co., operating the Kings Station mine south of this city, makes the following public statement:

"The new fireproof tipples and screening plant at the King Station mine of the Princeton Mining Company, which is the most modern and up-to-date coal cleaning plant in the middle west, will be ready to operate Tuesday, September 2nd, 1930.

"This plant was engineered and built by The Roberts & Scheffer Company of Chicago, who are considered one of the outstanding Engineering Companies of this line in the country.

"The Princeton Mining Company who own and operate the King Station mine is an independent company and does not belong to the Indiana Coal Operators Association. The King Station mine has been hoisting coal ever since it was opened, about seven years ago, double shift, that is, it hoisted two distinct shifts, one known as the day shift, the other known as the night shift.

"The first of April, 1924, the Operators Association and the United Mine Workers officials met in Terre Haute, Indiana, and made a contract, which governs all union shaft mines in the state of Indiana. In this contract they inserted a clause that there should be no coal hoisted on double shift or night shift. They made an exception to this clause by allowing new mines, while 'breaking away,' to hoist coal on double shift for six months.

"There is a great deal of soreness and bitterness among the operators in the north field, who control the Operators Association, against the Princeton Mining Company for competitive reasons and because the Princeton Mining Company does not belong to the Operators Association.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Aug. 30.—(UP)—Cloudy skies had only a slight effect on the thousands of visitors to the annual state fair today and exhibit buildings and carnival shows were filled with enthusiastic sight-seers.

Showers last night settled the dust and brought relief from sultry weather. Although today was expected to remain cloudy, no precipitation was expected.

Nearly 10,000 persons were expected to pass through the fair gates today, paying tribute to Hoosier youth in whose honor the opening day was dedicated.

Judging of exhibits of boys' and girls' clubs, including swine, beef, poultry, cooking, sewing, and other divisions of 4-H Club entries, was the chief event of the day. Judging of the other exhibits will be started Monday.

As the fair got under way today, officials announced there were more than 22,000 exhibits of boys' and girls' work and 1,654 exhibits in the adult divisions.

Fair officials were hopeful today that a new attendance record will be set this year. Last year a grand total of 245,194 passed through the fair turnstiles. Premiums and purses to be awarded this year total \$170,000, and officials said this is the largest amount awarded by any state fair in the country.

Sunday's program will be in keeping with the Sabbath. Following a Sunday school service in the woman's building, which all members of the girls' school and the boys' camp will attend, the Indiana Anti-Saloon League plans to have church services in its tent with Dr. C. H. Winders as the speaker.
