COAL FIELDS; RUSH RTHUR STRIP MINE; MADE IN OTHER FIELDS

OAKLAND CITY, Ind., July 21—
 (Special)—Coal mine activity through this section and particularly in Pike county, is showing a decided increase.

Fifty men have been added to the construction force of the new strip mine near Arthur by The New York Electric Shovel Coal Corporation, recent purchasers of the Ayrshire No. 8 mine, and preparation plant. The mine tippie is being changed from a deep mine to strip mine tippie. Strip mine stripping machines are being set up and a switch is being built to the Big Four branch. George E. Garlinger is in charge of the company's district sales offices at Oakland City.

Coal is being tested in the Littles vicinity and it is stated that a new tippie will be constructed there with a slope mine to be operated. It is stated that a double switch will be built from the old Big Four switch for operation of the slope mine. The Neal Coal Co. owns the old mine, which was leased by the Gibson Coal Co. It is recalled that the old Littles mine was the scene of a recent disturbance and likewise the old tippie was destroyed by fire.

Testing of land for coal south of Oakland City by the Maumee Coal Co., is expected to start next week. Aubra Battram, of Oakland City, is engaged in leasing about 2,000 acres for the company. Reports are that a strip mine will be opened in the field.

WHEAT SHOWS SHARP DECLINE ON CHICAGO BOARD

CHICAGO, Ill., July 21.—(U-P)—Predominance of bearish news with lack of buying power on the breaks sent wheat sharply lower, on the board of trade today. Corn and oats followed the downturn.

Wheat closed $1\frac{1}{2}$ to $2\frac{1}{2}$ cents down, corn was off $\frac{5}{8}$ to 1 cent, and oats lost $\frac{1}{2}$ to $\frac{1}{4}$ cent. Provisions were slightly lower.

Overnight longs and northwestern houses sold wheat on continued weakness at Winnipeg. Buying support was lacking on the breaks. It was reported that the Canadian pool was offering abroad 3 cents below the prices of other extorters. Receipts were 70 cars with the cash market 1 cent lower.

December corn hit a new low early in the day. Receipts were large, especially for a Saturday. Buying power was lacking, due chiefly to the weakness in wheat. The cash market was 1 to $1\frac{1}{2}$ cent lower with receipt of 300 cars.

SUPREME COURT RULINGS MADE IMPORTANT CA

GILLIOM ATTEMPT TO INCI SHUMAKER PENALTY FA STEPHENSON AND HO FAIL IN THEIR APPEALS

INDIANAPOLIS, July 20.—Indiana lost its case against Dr. Shumaker; D. C. Stephenson, ex-governor of the Ku Klux Klan and Holmes, erstwhile contender for Indianapolis mayoralty, lost appeals in decisions handed down by the supreme court which are on appeal today.

Dr. Shumaker had been sentenced to serve 60 days on the state farm for contempt of court. Attorney general had attempted to have the sentence increased but under supreme court ruling this could not be accomplished.

Dr. Shumaker, however, has announced that he will appeal his sentence and the \$250 fine to the United States Supreme court.

Stephenson's appeal to the supreme court was from the Marion circuit court for his release from Michigan City state prison on writ of habeas corpus.
