## FAIR MUSIC WILL BE FURNISHED BY GRAHAM BROS. BAND

W. H. RODEBICK, SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC IN WASHINGTON, IND., THE DIRECTOR—"JAZZ" ORCHESTRA TO PLAY THE FREE ACTS.

Excellent music is assured for the Gibson County Fair, beginning Aug. 24. Contracts have been closed with the Washington Graham Band of 23 pieces which will furnish music throughout the week.

This band is financed by Mr. Graham of Graham Bros., automobile manufacturers, and no expense has been spared in making it one of the very best musical organizations.

It is under the direction of Prof. W. H. Rodebick, supervisor of music in the Washington schools and a director and musician of note. Professor Rodebick is a tenor soloist, and during his college career was a member of the University of Wisconsin band and glee club. He was for three seasons on tour with the Redpath Chautauquas.

In addition to playing at the Gibson County Fair this band will play at the Indiana State Fair and at the National Livestock Show at St. Louis.

In addition to the regular band the organization also has a "jazz" orchestra which will furnish much of the music for the free acts program.

No expense has been spared by the fair association in bringing the best musical organization available for the fair this year.

## FINAL MEETING FOR LABOR DAY PLANS, SUNDAY

TEAM CAPTAINS WILL DRAW POSITIONS FOR PARADE; TEN BANDS, TWO CALLIOPES TO TAKE PART, ANNOUNCED.

The final meeting in preparation for the Labor Day celebration to be held at the Princeton fair grounds Monday, Sept. 7, will be held Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Central Labor Union hall in this city.

Final details for the day's program will be made and team captains will draw for positions in the parade. According to present arrangements, there will be six bands and two calliopes in the parade.

The two calliopes are the property of the Hoosier Carnival Co., who will be at the fair grounds for Labor Day. The features of this company are a minstrel show, four rides and nine other attractions.

Many representatives of labor unions south of the B. and O. railroad are expected to be in attendance at Sunday's meeting.

## SEVEN NEW FIELD AUDITORS ASKED TO CHECK SALES

ACTIVITY OF BOOTLEG GASOLINE DEALERS CALLS FOR THOROUGH INSPECTION — DELINQUENTS PAID \$200,000.

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 13.—(UP)—Employment of seven additional Field Auditors, bringing the staff to 12 members, in an effort to prevent bootlegging of gasoline into Indiana, was proposed by State Auditor Floyd E. Williamson.

It is the work of the field auditors to check the books of the 354 gasoline firms in Indiana to prevent gasoline tax delinquency, he said. Williamson said a check of 102 firms in the last eight months had resulted in collection of nearly \$200,000 in back taxes.

He further explained that shipment of gasoline tax-free into Indiana from Illinois and other states was not within jurisdiction of his department, since it did not constitute an evasion of Indiana tax laws.

## CITY COUNCIL TENTATIVELY ADOPTS BUDGET

The budget for 1932 expenditures has been tentatively adopted by the city council, calling for a reduction of 3 cents for next year.

The present tax rate for citizens of Princeton is \$1.18 per \$100 of assessed valuation, while next year on the basis of the budget adopted at the meeting Wednesday night, they will pay on a rate of \$1.15 per \$100.
