DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE FIXES
THAT FOR RETAILING A
POUND OF SUGAR

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—Eleven cents a pound is a fair retail price for sugar, it has been decided by the department of justice, assistant attorney general C. B., Ames said today.

· "Dealers charging more will be indicted," Ames said. "Ten cents is a fair wholesale price. The added cent is enough profit for retail dealers."

Ames asked consumers who are charged more to write to the department of justice or U. S. district attorneys and aid the campaign to catch profiteers.

Some retail sugar dealers are selling for 15 cents a pound, the department has heard.

Ames declared the department has obtained conviction of two profiteers, one at Pittsburg and another at Binghampton, New York. In this case the profiteers was fined \$500. The Binghampton profiteer was a grocer who was selling sugar at 15 cents a pound.
