BOYCOTT PLAN IN MEXICO PROVING EFFECTIVE, REPORT

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 19.—(By U.P.)—The Catholic boycott in Mexico against the church laws is becoming more effective, especially in central Mexico states, Acting Commissioner George Wyhte, Mexico City, commerce department, in a report said today.
Many orders in all the lines of business have been cancelled, the report said. Automotive sales in Mexico City have been reduced one-half.

IN AIRPLANE FALL

The American killed was Robert Blaney of Boston.
