**FINLAND BLAZES FORTH**  
AMSTERDAM Aug. 2 —(UP)—  
Finland showed the way to all nations  
in the Olympic games today, scoring  
25 points in the three men's finals —  
the hop, step and jump, the 1500 met-  
ers and the javelin.

The United States scored only five  
points, a second place in the javelin.

### INDIANA TAX BOARD SLAPS ON INCREASE GIBSON CO. NOT IN

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 2 —(UP)—  
Modification of taxes in several In-  
diana counties was made in orders  
sent out today by the state tax board.  
The list includes a number of counties  
but Gibson county is not included.

Knox County—An eleven and one-  
ninth per cent increase on lands in  
Vincennes township outside of Vincen-  
nes city, and an increase of ten per  
cent on lands in Harrison township.

Lake County :A twenty five per cent  
increase on all lands and improve-  
ments in north township; a thirty per  
cent increase on all lots in Hobart  
City; and a 40 per cent increase on  
lots and improvements in the city of  
New Chicago.

Posey county—A ten per cent in-  
crease on lands and lots in the en-  
tire county.

Laporte County—A fifty per cent  
increase on all lots and improvements  
in the cities of Laporte and Michigan  
City.
