AT LEAST SIX BANDS, MANY FLOATS AND DISPLAYS, HUNDREDS OF MARCHERS—PARADE TO START PROMPTLY AT 10 A. M.

The parade through principal streets of Princeton and to the fairgrounds next Monday morning, Sept. 7, at 10 o'clock, as a starter for the gigantic union Labor Day celebration, gives every indication of being the greatest and most beautiful street pageant ever witnessed in this city or section, according to officials of the Southern Indiana Labor Day Association, which sponsors the annual celebration.

Floats have been under construction for several days, with indications of some 50 floats from over this section being in the parade it is stated. It is already known that at least six bands will be in the line, while a number of local unions not yet reporting their detailed plans, will in all probability bring along a band, drum corps or other organization to head their respective delegations.

Washington, Ind., Shopcrafts and numerous other labor unions of that city are planning extensive participation in the parade and days festivities, thus augmenting the great Labor Day parades of the past.

Floats of business firms, as well as representations of local unions in the parade, will compete for cash prizes, while prizes are also offered for store window displays of strictly union-made goods here. Miners locals will also compete for their own loving cup.

A rule has been made by the association that all vehicles in the parade must be decorated, with no plain autos or other vehicles permitted in the line. In addition to the many floats and other displays, hundreds of union laboring men, including miners, shopcrafts and various other locals, will march.

## OVERHEAD DOORS ARE INSTALLED

Installation of new overhead doors, which roll up over the entrance, was completed Thursday at local fire department headquarters. ## WATSON TALKS OF THINGS THAT FIT DAY, NOT ISSUES

### REPUBLICANS OF NEW EIGHTH DISTRICT HOLD ORGANIZATION MEETING AT TELL CITY THURSDAY.

TELL CITY, Ind., Sept. 3.—(UP)—A sweeping Republican victory in the 1932 presidential race was predicted today by Sen. James E. Watson, here attending the G. O. P. re-organization meeting of the new Eighth district.

"President Hoover is as well as re-nominated," Watson said in an interview preceding his address at 2 p.m. "He will have no opposition."

Watson was reluctant to talk on unemployment which, Democrats have hinted, may be a major contention in the next election.

"Unemployment will not be an issue in the next campaign," Watson said assuringly. "The situation will be met through the presidential plan in co-operation with county and township organizations. Township trustees are elected to meet just such emergencies as this."

The senator viewed economic conditions optimistically. "They are better now than last year," he said. "Farm prices might be higher, but farmers bins are bursting with grain and they have plenty to eat."

District Chairman Ben Huffman, of Rockport, presided at the opening meeting. New Albany representatives started a campaign to re-elect James Dunbar to Congress. Dunbar has served three terms.

Bert Thurman, national committee-man, and Elza Rogers, state chair-man, were present.

Gibson county is not included in the Eighth district and only a few interested attended the Tell City meeting.
