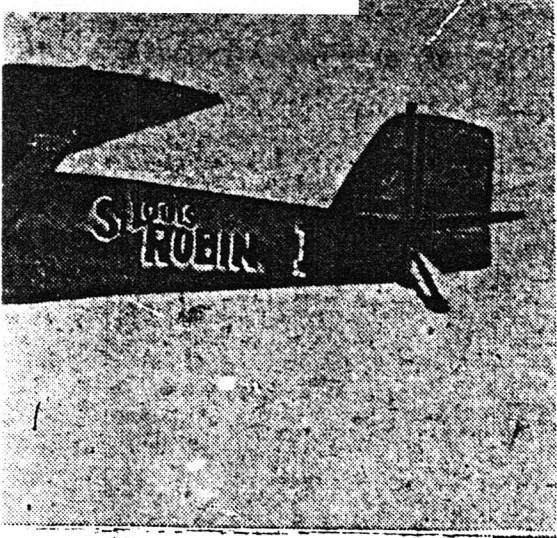

JEWELL TO SPEAK AT BIG LABOR DAY CELEBRATION

NOTED MAN SECURED — PROGRAM RAPIDLY TAKING SHAPE FOR BOONVILLE EVENT—MAKE EFFORTS FOR SPECIAL TRAIN

Plans are going forward rapidly for the gigantic union Labor day celebration at Boonville, Monday, Sept. 2.

Efforts are being made to obtain a special train over the Southern from Princeton to Boonville via Huntingburg. This train, if secured, would stop at all points enroute and it is expected hundreds of persons would make the trip by train in the morning and returning at night.

B. M. Jewell, president of the railway department, American Federation of Labor, has been secured as one of the principal speakers in the Boonville fairgrounds. The Farm Bureau will likewise participate and will have a noted speaker, it is announced.

Some six or eight bands will participate in the gigantic morning parade.

The executive and entertainment committees will meet in the C. L. U. hall, this city, next Sunday afternoon, August 4, at 2 o'clock, for the purpose of buying free acts and other attractions for the Labor day entertainment.

The play starts at 8:30 Thursday morning, with crowning of the state champion Saturday afternoon. A handsome silver loving cup is to be awarded the state champ, with individual trophies for outstanding players, those displaying the best sportsmanship in the tourney, etc.
