TOWEL TOSSED INTO RING IN MONDAY NIGHT BOUT AS WEBSTER BLEEDS PROFUSELY — OTHER INTERESTING CARDS

Jimmie Hitch, "the Princeton flash" was hitting harder and showed plenty of action and "punch" Monday night at the fairgrounds in his bout carded with Adrian Webster, Princeton youth and Hitch won the scheduled 8-round bout in the second round when after hammering Webster, a towel was tossed into the ring and the fight ended.

The two Princeton boys in the last and main bout of the evening got away to a good start, each landing some hard blows. Hitch went down for a second in the first round, but came back strong and at the bell was tapping Webster right and left in a corner of the ring. Throughout the second round, Hitch had the better of the argument and continued his assault on Webster, in spite of the fact that the latter was doing his best and staging a neryv battle. Bleeding profusely, Webster was rushed into a corner, where Hitch continued the punching and a towel was tossed into the ring, ending the bout.

Considering everything, Hitch was better and deserved to win, but Webster was game and exhibited plenty of nerve, with some good punching power. It was Webster's first appearance in a boxing ring, he was appearing before a tremendous crowd and on the other hand, Hitch's all around ability and experience told. It was an interesting bout to say the least.

As a preliminary, Terre Haute and Sullivan boys staged a whirlwind 6-round bout, one weighing 110 pounds and the other weighing 100. This bout was a rare treat and the "action" kept the fans in a splendid mood. It was one of the best bouts witnessed by local fans.

A "battle royal" between five colored boys and men as the second attraction just preceding the Hitch-Webster fight delighted the crowd and brought forth wild cheering, laughter and applause, as first one, then the other went out and some "framed on others.

KATE R. O'HARE DECLARES FOR BEST UNION LEADERS

Declaring that membership and organization is worth nothing, even though thousands or millions might belong to the workers unions, without "honest, conscientious, competent, American leadership," Mrs. Kate Richards O'Hare, nationally prominent in the great labor movement, held the attention of thousands at the fair grounds Monday with an hour and 10 minutes address.

Mrs. O'Hare called attention to the number of organized workers in Gibson county, but declared the mere numbers will avail nothing if there is not competent leadership.

As another keynote remark, Mrs. O'Hare mentioned the fact that in time of labor strife, she has seen much bloodshed and horrible conditions, and declared that war and depredation by striking union men avails nothing. She declared that upon workers can't gain their point by fighting, shooting, cutting, stoning, killing, during time of walkouts any more than wars are won on battlefields with guns and poison gas, but "it is at the conference table that the details are ironed out and we gain our point."

Mrs. O'Hare recalled her 14 months imprisonment during the war, but declared "it was the better for me and the best thing that ever happened to labor, for there I was able to study conditions." Mrs. O'Hare made a strong plea for patronizing of union labor and buying union-made apparel and goods.

Mrs. O'Hare devoted much of her address to the farmers and their wives and various farm problems, praised the fact that farmers are now "waking up" and uniting with union workers, and that this is the first time in Gibson county that all have united in a great demonstration. She declared farmers and workers problems are closely related.

The address was received with repeated bursts of applause.
