## GIBSON COUNY IS PLANNING A REAL WELCOME FOR HER WAR HEROES; COMMITTEES WORKING ON THE PLANS

On June 24 at a called meeting of  
 the board of directors of the fair as-  
 sociation, it was unanimously decided  
 to set aside Tuesday, September 2,  
 1919, as Welcome Home Day for all  
 Gibson county soldiers and sailors. A  
 motion was made and carried without  
 a dissenting vote that the president  
 appoint a committee of seven to make  
 all the arrangements. President Mur-  
 phy selected Stuart T. Fisher as the  
 general chairman of the day and the  
 following six men to serve with Mr.  
 Fisher as assistants from the fair  
 board: William W. Sipp, William B.  
 Bingham, Madison M. Knowles, Claude  
 A. Smith, Charles A. Stegle and Joseph  
 P. Yochum. Mr. Fisher has been con-  
 tinuously since that time on the job.

The county council was called to-  
 gether by Auditor Armstrong and en-  
 thusiastically agreed to O K an expen-  
 diture of not to exceed \$4,000. Chair-  
 man Fisher, who was present at the  
 meeting of the council suggested that  
 the council appoint men from the var-  
 ious townships to assist the fair com-  
 mittee in seeing that the day was prop-  
 erly observed and the money judic-  
 iously spent. Since that time the coun-  
 cil has appointed the following men  
 to serve and these men are now all at  
 work: Curtis Butler, Columbia town-  
 ship; Clarence McRoberts, Washington  
 township; M. O. Decker, Hazleton, and

W. B. Bingham, Patoka, from White  
 River township; Albert W. Thompson,  
 Montgomery township; Paul Maier, of  
 Wabash township; George T. Ford, Un-  
 ion township; W. W. Sipp, Johnson  
 town-ship; S. G. Marshall, Center town-  
 ship, and B. C. Fulling, Barton town-  
 ship.

Chairman Fisher has also appointed  
 the following committees: On speak-  
 ers, Robert C. Baltzell, John C. Gor-  
 man, Fred R. Ewing; on barbecue,  
 Dick Smith, Oscar Spore and George  
 Ford; on transportation, Ed. Criswell;  
 on fireworks, P. S. Brownlee, W. W.  
 Sipp and Albert Thompson.

Since the meeting of the county  
 council, the board of county commis-  
 sions have been in session and have  
 given their approval to the plan and  
 the board of commissioners have been  
 authorized by the state board of ac-  
 counts to spend a sum not to exceed  
 \$2500.

The whole county is bending every  
 effort to see that Gibson county gives  
 its soldiers and sailors a real wel-  
 come. Chairman Fisher or any of his  
 assistants welcome any suggestions
