The plans as given a final O. K. at the Oakland City meeting, are the same as announced in The Daily Democrat Monday. The Labor Day program will open with a concert in the court yard from 9 to 10 a.m. by Bachman's Million Dollar Band, which is playing the Gibson County Fair engagement here all next week and which the Labor Day committee was exceedingly fortunate in being able to obtain for Monday morning.

The gigantic parade through the business section of the city, with labor unions throughout this entire section and farmers organizations in line, will move from south Main street promptly at 10 o'clock, to the fair grounds, where the all day program will be held. The Bachman band will play a 40 minute concert at the fair grounds immediately following the parade.

The fair grounds program includes addresses by noted speakers, free acts, band music, balloon ascension, horse shoe pitching contest, boxing and wrestling program, and a fine display of fireworks to close the evening.

W. H. Norcross, manager of Seminoe lake, east of the city, is in charge of the boxing and wrestling program and he is lining up the best card to ever appear here. The boxers, wrestlers and all details of this big feature of the Monday night program at the fair grounds will be announced within a day or two. Lovers of these sports are assured a real treat.
