# LABOR DAY PLANS ARE PROGRESSING, COMMITTEES SAY

### EXTEND EFFORTS TO MAKE PARADE GREATEST YET, WITH FLOATS AND UNIONS—PIKE COUNTY COMING STRONG.

According to reports of committees having in charge the annual Labor Day celebration in Princeton on the first Monday in September, plans are progressing quite satisfactorily and every indication points to a big time for the day.

Sunday, July 22, a meeting will be held at Petersburg at 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon to make arrangements for the locals of Pike county to attend the celebration at Princeton. A delegation from Princeton, will attend the meeting.

Many business firms of the county have indicated they will have floats in the parade and an invitation is extended all who desire to take part by being represented in the parade.

It is the intention of the committee in general charge to have every union organization in the district represented in the parade, and work to that end is being pushed.

MOSCOW, July 18 —(UP) — The icebreaker Krassin, which already has brought 16 men out of the Arctic alive after most of them had given up hope of again reaching civilization will not quit its errand of mercy until one last search has been made for 12 others lost in that ice bound area.

The Krassin, with its cargo of rescued explorers, was ordered by the Soviet Relief Commission to continue to Advent Bay to refuel so that the second great search could be started immediately.

The 12 men still lost may be dead. Six may have died in an explosion aboard the dirigible Italia as it floated away after the crash on May 2. Six others may have died when Roald Amundsen led his airplane expedition into the ice area.

But observers on the Krassin said there was reason to believe these 12 might still be living.

The men still missing include: Prof. Aldo Pontremoli, Renato Alessandrini, Ettore Arduino, Attilio Caratti, Calisto Ciocca, Ugo Lago, Roald Amundsen, Lief Dietrichsen, Rene Guibaud, Lieut. De Cuverville, M. Caudebec, M. Brazz.

The first six were those who floated away with the envelope of the Italia. The latter six were in the Latham seaplane that Amundsen commanded on the Relief Expedition that left Tromsø, Norway, June 18, and has not been heard from since.

The commander of the Krassin believes there still is a chance that the first six are now stranded on some ice floe not far from where the Vigilien group was found.

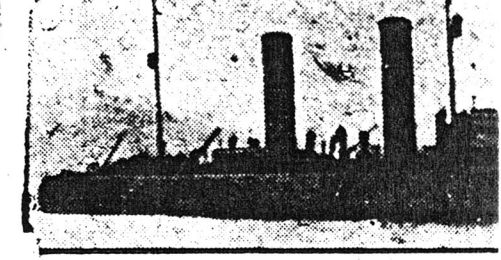
