## LABOR DAY PROCLAMATION ISSUED BY THE GOVERNOR

Governor Goodrich has called on the people of Indiana to observe Monday, September 1, as Labor day, and to pay tribute not only to what labor did during the war, but to what labor will do during the critical readjustment period. The proclamation reads:

By the law and the custom of the people of the United States, the first Monday of September each year is set apart for the paying of respect and tribute to the man who labors. It is customary on the anniversary to call attention to the vital part which labor has had to do with the building of this great nation, and to emphasize the great importance to his country of the man who toils.

For the past two years we have repeatedly asserted the necessity of labor to the winning of the war. Laboring men in every corner of the United States were urged to do their full duty in the great struggle of liberty against autocracy. And perform their full share they did, bearing with every class of men a part of the burden of the world war.

Now peace has come upon us once more, but peace has not relieved us of all of our burdens, has not quieted the unrest, which came with the hard days through which we have just passed. The problem of reconstruction and readjustment is a terrific one, and here labor must play a part as important as that it carried through successfully in

time of war. That labor will do this I am confident, relying as I do on the sturdy Americanism and sincere patriotism which has always marked the workers in the United States.

But let us all remember that with our burdens becoming greater mainly through economic conditions over which we have no control, it is the duty of every man to do his share toward the common good. Only by adhering strictly to American principles and working to a common purpose can we overcome the obstacles which beset us as a nation.

In order that we may pay tribute to that which labor has accomplished and afford inspiration, so far as possible, for that which must be done in the future.

Therefore, I, James P. Goodrich, governor of Indiana, do hereby proclaim and designate Monday, September 1, 1919, to be Labor Day, and a legal holiday throughout the state of Indiana, and do suggest that the people so far as possible desist from their usual vocations, and by suitable exercises pay their respect to the laboring men of the United States.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the great seal of the state of Indiana to be affixed. Done in the capitol at Indianapolis, this 28th day of August, 1919.

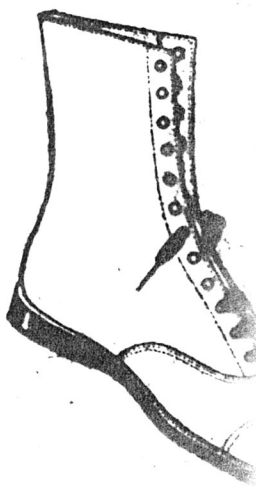


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
