# PLACES ASSIGNED FOR LABOR PARADE

## MARSHAL AND ASSISTANTS DESIGNATE STREETS ON WHICH ORGANIZATIONS WILL TAKE PLACES MONDAY MORNING

Formation and line of march for the great Labor day parade in Princeton on Monday morning, September 3, were announced today.

The parade divisions will form on streets in the south part of the city, east and west of Main street. The head of the parade will move on Main street promptly at 10 o'clock and the delegations, under the assistant parade marshals, will move out of the respective intersecting streets into the line. The entire space on all streets from Clark south to Kentucky has been set aside for the parade divisions.
