Weather conditions, competition of other attractions and probably other factors have contributed to this condition.

## HERMAN DIRIGIBLE ENDS SCIENTIFIC FLIGHT TO NORTH

MORE THAN 50,000 SQUARE KILOMETERS OF HITHERTO UNKNOWN TERRITORY EXPLORED - BALLOONS SENT UP INTO STRATOSPHERE

It was pointed out, at a previous meeting, that the Gibson county fair receives neither county nor state aid although at various times it has been shown that under a state law provision is made for a county appropriation to encourage agricultural and boys' and girls' farm club exhibits.

FRIEDRICHSHAFEN, July 31. — The dirigible Graf Zeppelin completed her latest bit of globe-trotting today when she settled down in her hangar after a seven-day cruise to the arctic.

The Gibson county fair has been recognized widely as one of the best fairs in the country. The grounds are unrivaled in point of beauty and comfort and there are few places of the kind that are so accessible over improved highways.

The ship reached her home port sooner than had been expected and for an hour the big ship cruised over Friedrichshafen and Lake Constance before Dr. Hugo Eckener brought her to the ground at 5 a. m. (11 p. m., Thursday, Eastern Standard Time).

The fair officials would be loath to omit the annual event from this year's calendar but nevertheless are trying to face conditions as they are and whatever decision is reached will be on the basis of practical judgment, in the light of conditions this year.

The arctic cruise was described by Dr. Eckener as highly successful and as a relatively easy trip. "Often we enjoyed skies of Italian blue," he said, "and we never were bothered by the discomforts of the arctic."

## BRITISH BUDGET OUTLOOK GRAVE, SAYS SNOWDEN

**Too Hot in Heavy Togs**  
 Professor Samolovich, one of the passenger scientists, complained because the weather was too warm.

LONDON, July 31.—(P)—Chancellor Phillips Snowden told the house of commons Thursday the outlook for the budget next year was very serious unless considerable economies could be effected.

"We all perspired copiously in our arctic outfits," he said. Dr. Eckener already is planning another cruise to the north. He expressed the hope that in time the Graf Zeppelin would become a favorable method of transportation for persons who feel the call of the north.

Great Britain's budgetary position is more satisfactory than that of any of the other great countries, however, he said, and the government intends to take every possible step to balance next year's budget no matter how unpleasant the process may be.

The scientists charted more than 50,000 square kilometers of hitherto unknown territory, according to Professor Samolovich, and sent up numerous observation balloons, of which at least two undoubtedly reached the stratosphere.
