

Every one made a report upon blanks furnished by the department. 291 of these institutions are located in the cities of the state; 232 in incorporated towns and 160 in unincorporated towns. There are 84 cities in Indiana and the banks are distributed as follows: 5 cities have one bank each; 25 have 2 banks; 27 have 3 banks; 13 have 4 banks; 7 have 5 banks; Frankfort has 6 banks; Terre Haute has 7 banks; South Bend has 8 banks; Evansville has 9 banks; Lafayette has 10 banks Fort Wayne has 12 banks and Indianapolis has 16 banks. Sullivan is the only incorporated town in the state that has as many as four banks. Out of 342 incorporated towns, 232 have one or more banks.

The total resources of all financial institutions in Indiana are \$268,278,172.07. Total amount of taxes paid \$37,690,462.15; total deposits \$201,024,504.32; total number of depositors 540,112; total employees 3,013.

The total resources of all national banks is \$146,554,652.25; deposits, \$105,175,727.55; depositors, 213,537.

The total resources of all state banks is \$49,140,406.72; deposits, \$31,167,630.80; depositors, 105,402.

The total resources of all private banks is \$37,275,220.01; total deposits, \$30,131,078.70; depositors, 112,214.

The total resources of trust companies and saving bank is \$44,307,893.09; deposits, \$35,150,067.27; depositors, 108,959.

The oldest national bank is the first national of Madison incorporated September 18, 1862.

The oldest state bank is the People's bank of Portland organized March 1, 1873.

The oldest private bank is the Bloom bank of Goshon, Ind. Established January 1, 1854.

The first savings bank, the Lafayette savings and trust company, began business July 1, 1869.

The first trust company, the Indiana trust company of Indianapolis, organized April, 1893.

PRINCETON UNIONS

PREPARING FOR TRIP TO VINCENNES NEXT MONDAY.

Vincennes Laboring Men will Entertain Visitors in Great Style—

The different local unions are making great preparations for the big labor celebration to be held at Vincennes on Labor Day, Monday, Sept. 4. A special train carrying the Princeton delegation will leave the E. & T. H. station at 8:26 a. m. Returning the train will leave some time in the evening, when the big celebration is over.

The big parade will begin to move promptly at 10 o'clock. All the visiting delegations and the Vincennes unions will be in line of march. Immediately after the march is over the men will go to Lincoln park where the program will be carried out. Mayor George E. Green, of Vincennes, will deliver the address of welcome and he will be followed by Charles W. Kleckner, of Logansport, the principal speaker. Mr. Kleckner's address will be an appeal for the protection and help of the laboring man.

A special attraction of the afternoon program is Troop G, United States cavalry, which will give a number of drills. A wheelbarrow race, tug-of-war, hundred yard dash and a three-legged race are other forms of amusement which have been provided for the visitors.

Vincennes is making a great effort to out do anything ever seen in a labor celebration in this part of the state, and it looks as though she will succeed. Princeton laboring men should remember how Vincennes turned out for the celebration here last year and return the favor. W. H. Van Stone, of this city, will have charge of the Princeton representation.
