THE LABOR DAY LINE OF MARCH

PARADE, TO BE ONE OF BEST
 EVER SEEN HERE

OVER TWENTY ORGANIZATIONS
 TO BE IN LINE

Two Bands Will Be Included—School Children Asked to Participate—Where Each Division Will Join In—Many Floats Being Prepared—Tomorrow to Be Busy Day at Lafayette Park

There will be some lively stepping around in Lafayette park, off west Spruce street, all of Saturday getting the platform and pavilions erected, seats placed and other work completed in preparation for the biggest Labor Day celebration Monday that Princeton has ever had. Officials of the Central Labor Union and heads of the various unions are up to their ears in work of preparation. Every union is arranging a big turnout, and there will be dozens of floats.

The program of novelty contests will begin as soon as the parade reaches the grounds Monday morning. Owing to the uncertainty of time of arrival of some of the speakers, no announcement has been made as to the hour of the addresses. There is positive assurance Senator Kern and several other speakers will be here, it is stated. Mayor D. R. Head will deliver the address of welcome and Claude A. Smith will preside as temporary chairman, introducing the speakers.

William Whitten will be grand chief marshal of the parade, N. C. Blake will be chief marshal and Sherman Davis assistant chief. More than twenty organizations will be in line, with dozens of floats. The Ft. Branch miners are coming with a strong delegation and miners will also be here from Ayrshire, Muren and other points east.

CONSTANTINE HAS ABDICATED

REVOLUTION REPORTED UNDER
 WAY IN GREECE

Crown Prince George, Said to Have Assumed the Regency, is Known to Be Pro-Ally

(By United Press)

LONDON, Sept. 1.—A serious revolution has broken out in northern Greece, and according to Salonika advices King Constantine has abdicated the throne.

Special dispatches from Salonika this afternoon say the revolutions are in control of one district in Macedonia. Athens apparently is cut off from communication with the outside world. No confirmation of Constantine's abdication could be had, therefore, from the Greek capital.

The 26-year-old Crown Prince George, according to Salonika reports, assumed the regency following his father's abdication.

An idol of the Greek people, and pro-ally in sympathy, he is understood to have the backing of ex-Premier Venizelos.

It is believed here that Greece, influenced by Bulgarian's declaration of war on Roumania today, will immediately range her armies beside those of Roumania to crush the Bulgarians.

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The Parade

The head of the parade will rest on Gibson street at Water, move north on Gibson to State, west on State to Main, south on Main to Broadway, west on Broadway to Hart, north on Hart to State, east on State to Main, north on Main to Spruce, west on Spruce to Lafayette park.

All who are to participate in the parade are to be in their places in plenty of time to permit the entire march to start promptly at 9:30.

The various organizations and marchers will fall into line in the following order:

The police and fire departments and city officials will head the parade and will assemble on Gibson at Water.

The school children—and all who will are urged to participate—are to assemble at the Lowell school grounds at 8:30 o'clock. They will march east in Water street to Gibson and fall in behind the representatives of the city departments.

The Princeton band will follow the school children, with the members of the Central Labor Union behind the band. The band and C. L. U. will fall in from Water street.

will form in Clark street and march into Gibson from there.

The Miners of Princeton and vicinity and the Painters will assemble in Monroe street and join the line of march on Gibson street from there.

The Machinists, Boilermakers, Blacksmiths, Sheet Metal Workers and Printers will fall into line from Pinckney street.

The Barbers and Teamsters will join in from Mulberry street, with the Hazleton brass band heading the Teamsters.

All floats other than those of the labor organizations will join in from Christian street. This will include all who wish to ride in the parade in automobiles or other vehicles.

The reception committee and such speakers as may be here at the time of the parade will bring up the rear in automobiles.

Big Lump of Coal

A huge lump of coal taken out by the Princeton miners will be in the parade and also on exhibition at the park during the day. Under auspices of the C. L. U. guesses will be received on the weight of this huge lump—amounting to more than a load—and the person guessing nearest the weight will receive the lump. The name and guess, written, should be handed in some time during Labor Day to the secretary of the C. L. U., William Paul. The award will be made at a meeting
